
- Graduate degree often required in the fields of:



DECIDING WHETHER TO GO TO GRADUATE SCHOOL

Should you work first or immediately enroll in graduate school?

- Career goals
 - ➤ Will you need work experience? What kind (full-time, assistantship, internship, etc.)?
 - Do you need work experience to get the most out of your graduate program?
- Program and degree-level
 - Are you interested in a master's or doctoral degree?
 - Are you interested in research or a professional degree?

DECIDING WHETHER TO GO TO GRADUATE SCHOOL

OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

What kind of financial and time investments are involved?

- Funding and costs
 - ➤ How will you fund your program?
 - ➤ How much are you willing to invest?
- Time commitment
 - How long should you estimate it will take to complete your program?

- Participate in hands-on training
- Small class sizes
- Gain expert knowledge in a subject area and develop

specialized skills

- Masters
- Doctoral

DISCIPLINE-FOCUSED

Graduate School is Student-Centered

- Original Research, Creative Work, Practice
 - Investigate original research question
 - > Create original art, music, literature, etc.
- Graduate advisor and committee
 - Common research interests
 - One-on-one interactions—do your personal work styles mesh?
 - > Research group dynamics







Milestone Exams and Theses/Dissertations

Milestone exams

- Comprehensive exams
 - Oral
 - Written
- > Final Defense
 - Public presentation, performance, installation
 - Oral exam with committee

Written

- > Thesis, non-thesis
- Dissertation
- May include original materials (e.g. maps, works of art, musical scores, etc.) in addition to data.

Time Investment

Unlike undergraduate courses, research and creativity do not necessarily run on a semester time-scale, nor are there clear grades associated with progress.

- Full-time (MS ~1-2yrs; PhD ~3-5 yrs)
 - ➤ 6-9 hours of coursework per semester
 - ➤ May include 20 hrs per week in Assistantship
 - > Plus time for research, writing, practicing, etc.
 - May or may not include travel
- Part-time (extended time to degree)
 - > 3-6 hours coursework per semester
 - > Plus time for research, etc.
 - Often while working full-time job.
- Work-life balance is key to success!
